GUIDELINES ON THE GRADING OF SCHOOLS FOR THE COMPREHENSIVE SCHOOL SAFETY INITIATIVE (Mid-Year 2022)

- As part of the performance indicators included in the School Dashboard for the School Management, Monitoring & Evaluation and as a requirement in the implementation of Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Program in schools as provided for by RA 10121, DepEd Order No 37 s. 2015, DepEd Order No. 21 s. 2015, DepEd Order No. 23 s. 2015, and DepEd Order No. 43 s. 2012, the Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Unit of the Office of the Schools Division Superintendent will conduct the Mid-Year Grading of Schools for the Comprehensive School Safety Initiative from June 27 – 30, 2022.
- 2. The Grading will be conducted in two stages: 1) documentary submission and grading; and 2) on-site/ online validation of practices.
- 3. FOR THE DOCUMENTARY SUBMISSION AND GRADING, the following guidelines are hereby provided:
 - a. Schools will prepare a Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Program Implementation Portfolio with the following parts:
 - a.1. School Information
 - a.2. Enabling Environment
 - a.3. Safe Learning Facilities
 - a.4. School Disaster Management
 - a.5. Disaster Risk Reduction in Education

a.6. Other School Based-Initiated Programs Not Included in the CSSI Package

- b. The DRRM Program Implementation Portfolio Means of Verification (MOVs) to be included in the submission shall be arranged according to the Comprehensive School Safety Initiative Monitoring and Scoring Package for Schools (See Attachment).
- c. The DRRM Program Implementation Portfolio shall be submitted on or before June 17, 2022, 3:00pm at the Division Records Section for time stamping. It will then be forwarded to the Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Unit.
- d. The Project Development Officer II for DRRM will facilitate documentary grading on June 27 29, 2022.
- e. Graded CSSI Score Card will be released, together with the Division Certification, on July 1, 2022.



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- FOR ON-SITE/ ONLINE VALIDATION OF PRACTICES, the following guidelines are provided:
 - a. On-site/ online validation of practices will only be conducted when:
 - a.1. an MOV is not certified or validated by the school head or proper division personnel
 - a.2. a practice or proof of implementation is not available for validation
- 5. The CSSI Score card and certification will only be released when all validation are already conducted by the Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Unit.

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FOREWORD

Disaster Risk Reduction and Management (DRRM) is an important element of the learning continuity principle of the Department of Education. It is a vital support service component in the governance of schools and in the continuous provision of school operations to the community regardless of the situation or the emergency. With this in mind, the need to have a comprehensive mechanism in monitoring its implementation to schools is indispensable and a mandate of existing laws to ensure safety in government learning institutions.

In the recent years, the Department of Education continuously strengthens the program management and implementation of the Disaster Risk Reduction and Management across all governance levels by institutionalizing mechanisms, programs, and activities through issuances and policies. In support to the Republic Act 10121, also know as the Philippine Disaster Risk Reduction and Management System, various issuances were issued by the Department such as DepEd Order No. 37 s. 2015 also known as the Comprehensive Disaster Risk Reduction in Basic Education Framework, the DepEd Order No. 21 s. 2015 also known as the Information and Coordination Management Protocol, the DepEd Order No. 23 s. 2015 also known as the Family Earthquake Preparedness Homework, the Regional Memorandum No. 14 s. 2015 (IV-A) also known as the Standardization of Region/ Division/ School DRRM Team, the DepEd Order No. 43 s. 2012 also known as the Rules on Cancellation/ Suspension of Classes, the Joint Memorandum Circular No. 1 s. 2013 also known as the Guidelines on Evacuation Center Management, and the DepEd Order No. 28 s. 2016 also known as the Strengthening of the Fire Safety and Awareness Program.

Through the creation of the Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Unit in the City Schools Division of the City of Tayabas on December 1, 2021, the Schools Division Office have started to progressively plant localized mechanisms to ensure quality implementation of the programs in compliance to mentioned policies institutionalized by the Department of Education. This CSSI package aims to integrate and implement the monitoring of schools' implementation of the Comprehensive School Safety Initiative (CSSI) which is also one of the major performance indicators of schools in complying to the Monitoring and Evaluation (M & E) requirement of their institutional compliance.

As a **compliance**, the DepEd Tayabas DRRMS commits to uphold the highest form of quality service to schools. As an **innovation**, this CSSI package aims to help the schools in ensuring effective and holistic implementation of their DRRM Programs. And lastly, as an **intervention**, this package aims to assist schools in identifying their gaps, strengths, weakness, opportunities, and threats in the implementation of the DRRM programs which they may use in improving, restructuring, or enhancing their levels of practices.
